Principal's Message

October is Bullying Prevention Month!

This October, for the second year in a Villa Park Elementary will observing National Bullying Prevention Month. Throughout the month, we will be participating in school wide activities.

October 2-6 – Be Aware

Students will learn what bullying is and how is it different from conflict.

October 9-13 – Be Kind

Students will learn that kindness is the opposite of bullying and pledge to do something kind for a new person each day at school this week.

October 16-20 –Be an “Upstander”

Students will learn how they can be a hero by being an “upstander” when they see bullying behavior.

Wednesday October 25 –Be United

Staff and students are encouraged to wear orange to show their support for bullying prevention and inclusion.

Bullying Prevention Education Efforts at VPE

Each year we engage in several educational programs to help students learn positive social skills, and to recognize and respond to bullying. To distinguish bullying from routine “conflict” we teach children that bullying:

- It is repeated over time
- It is intended to hurt or intimidate the victim
- Is targeted to the same person or people and generally involves an imbalance of power, either physical or social.

Students are also taught that bullying generally falls into four areas. All of these actions are unacceptable at VPE.

- Physical bullying-such as hitting, pushing, tripping.
- Verbal bullying-such as insults or taunts, or threats, whether spoken or written
- Social bullying-such as deliberately excluding, intimidating, or spreading rumors
- Cyber bullying -such as mean or embarrassing texts, or online posts.

By using the criteria above, you can help your child to determine if what they are seeing or experiencing is indeed bullying. If a student should feel bullied at school:

- They are instructed to leave the situation whenever possible (rather than escalating the situation through retaliation) and report the bullying promptly to an adult.

Most often students will report to a teacher or supervisor, but students may report to any staff member, including the principal, who they may ask to see at any time. Students may also write a written note to the teacher or principal to report the situation.

- It is helpful if students clearly state they feel bullied:
I feel bullied by _____ because _____.

Another student, parent, or staff member may also report the concern. Whenever a bullying report is made it will be promptly investigated by the principal and parents of all involved students will be informed. Based on the investigation appropriate consequence follow up and monitor-

ing put in place to protect the interests of all children involved and discourage future occurrences.

In our education we also discuss the importance of not being a passive “bystander”, but by showing kindness and support when they see someone being bullied by helping students to leave the situation, and to report the bullying. This is called being an “upstander”. Annually as a part of their digital citizenship curriculum at school, students also complete a module on cyber bullying.

Please talk to your children about National Bullying Prevention Month and the things that we all can do to help make Villa Park a safe and caring community for all!

Makerspace

Makerspace is coming to the VPE Library. Thanks to a Grant from the Rotary Club!

Exciting things are happening the VPE library! This year our librarian, Mrs. Gina O'Dowd, worked with Robert Shumate, and Dan Gray from the Villa Park Rotary Club to secure a grant to create a Makerspace in the Villa Park Elementary Library. A Makerspace is a collaborative work space for making, learning, exploring and sharing that uses high tech to no tech tools. Our Makerspace at VPE will be a place for students to tinker with activities that run the gamut from sewing to robotics, and even a 3D printer. Recently, volunteers from the Villa Park and North Orange Rotary Clubs volunteered to work side by side with our Dad's Club reps to assemble tables and accessories. Parent Teacher Conferences

Oct 9th-13th

During the week of Oct 9th-13th, students will be released at 12:15 daily so that teachers can complete parent teacher conferences. It's natural for both parents and students to feel a little apprehensive about these upcoming conferences. Here are five tips to make your conference productive.

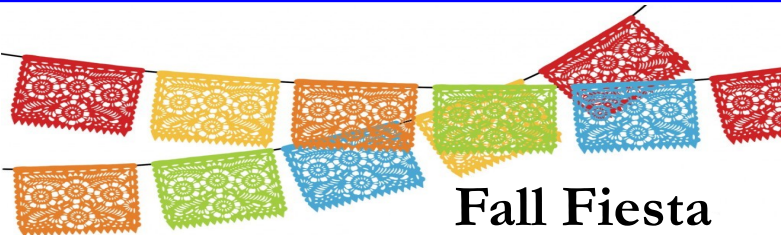
Honor your appointment- Be sure you know your appointment time, and stay on time. The teacher is likely to have a packed schedule and will appreciate your prompt arrival and timely completion. If you find you don't have enough time in the appointment to fully address your concerns, ask for a follow up appointment or phone call. There is very likely another parent waiting eagerly for the next appointment slot. If you have to cancel or reschedule, please let the teacher know as soon as possible.

Talk to your Student- Ask your child to let you know one thing he is doing well, and one thing he is concerned about in his classroom. This will give you a frame of reference for how your student is feeling about his class. Some teachers, especially of upper grade students, will want students to attend the conference as well. Check with your child's teacher if you are unsure.

Frontload the Teacher-If you have major concerns or questions, email the teacher in advance. That way she can do some investigation and be prepared for a thoughtful discussion during the conference.

Work to develop a positive partnership with the teacher- Listen with an open mind to the teacher's perspective on your child's progress. If the teacher's perspective surprises you, ask for an example. Request some suggestions on how you might help your child at home. Remember you and the teacher share the same goal of academic and behavioral success for your child. When your child knows that you and the teacher are working together and communicating regularly, she is more likely to be successful.

Be Growth Focused- Whether your child is excelling or struggling, our expectation is that each child is continuing to grow. Be sure you leave the conference with one or two goals for your child and a clear idea of what you can do to support those goals.

Orange Unified School District 2017-2018 Elementary Monitoring Student Fees, Donations, and Fundraising Guidelines Compliance

Section 5 of Article IX of the State of California Constitution guarantees students a "free public education." The State Supreme Court concluded in the 1984 case of Hartzell v. Connell, "that all educational activities carried on by public school districts, extra-curricular as well as curricula, must be without cost to the students who participate in such activities." This same ruling found that "mandatory fees for participating in such extra-curricular activities as drama, music, and athletic competition were illegal under the State Constitution." Furthermore, they also rejected the argument that "fees could be charged so long as the district waived fees for students who were financially unable to pay." Recent proposed legislation includes reimbursement with interest for any illegally-collected fees as well as a district sanction.

We are extremely fortunate to have such generous Villa Park families who donate supplies, funds and time in order to provide so many wonderful programs and activities for our students. Thank you.
